So far she has played 2 games for the County Team, but we look forward to hearing more about each game played.

GCSE Results 2019

Huge congratulations to each and every Y11 student who sat their GCSEs at Dene Magna last term. They worked so hard and have achieved outcomes that they can be so proud of, setting themselves well for the next stage of their learning journey.

GCSE results for 2019 are our strongest ever. There are two themes going on here: consistency over time and continual improvement. This is our head-line measure:

Students achieving Grade 4+ in both English and Maths: 73%

Students achieving Grade 5+ in both English and Maths: 44%

Our Progress 8 is currently 0.18, however this does not include nearly 40 regraded results.

There were some superb departmental results. The bedrock of this is a strong performance from the core subjects:

English 82% Grade 4+

Maths 79% Grade 4+

Science 76% Grade 4+.

In addition to this, showing our commitment to a broad and balanced curriculum, 11 subjects achieved greater than 80% Grade 4 and above. These outstanding results were across the Arts, Technology, Languages, PE and Humanities.

There are many highlights and superb individual outcomes, at all levels of attainment. We are particularly pleased to see the gap in performance for our disadvantaged students continue to diminish and that our Progress 8 score for our Pupil Premium students was this year 0.00, an amazing achievement. With the new grading system in place, we are delighted that 49 grade 9s have been awarded, including some students who achieved a number of grade 9s. 276 Grade 7+ were awarded to students and 24 students achieved 5 or more grade 7+. 79 students achieved at least one grade 7+ and all of these are continued improvements on last year.

Below are some highlights from the last two years, demonstrating those twin themes of consistency and continued improvement (the bracketed figure refers to 2018):

15% (15%) students achieved 5+ Grade 7 or above

48% (46%) students achieved at least 1 Grade 7+

49% (51%) students achieved 5+ Grade 5+

79% (72%) students achieved 5+ Grade 4+

53% (53%) grades were 5+

76% (75%) grades were 4+

The average grade for every result was 4.7 (4.7).

Headteacher Steve Brady said 'we are delighted for the students, staff and parents/carers who have worked so hard to ensure that our students are set to take their next steps into adult life. We are a truly comprehensive school and this was a real team effort and shows the strength of the community and curriculum at Dene Magna. We are particularly excited about welcoming the students to our new sixth form in September and congratulate everyone in their role in this success against the backdrop of these new, tougher GCSEs'.

Tycoon in Schools

Business Studies students are currently taking part in a national competition that is sponsored by none other than Dragon's Den Entrepreneur, Peter Jones CBE. The Peter Jones Foundation, sponsors students to start their own enterprise through the 'Tycoon in Schools' programme. The students from Year 10 and 12 have come up with their own business enterprise and have applied for the grant (start-up capital) from Tycoon to pay for raw materials to get their business underway. Y10s will be sponsored up to a £1,000 and Y12 up to £2,000. Students are hoping to show off their business ideas in school soon.

We finally opened the door to our first Dene Magna Sixth Form students this term - a momentous event as it marks the transformation of Dene Magna School into an 11-18 educational provider. Our inaugural Year 12 are studying a range of subjects, from Physics to French, Chemistry to Computing and plenty more, and lessons are well underway.

Student feedback includes comments such as "Everyone has been so friendly", and "It's really chilled here and I like feeling so much more grown-up." The teaching staff have been equally positive "such lovely students" and "I really enjoyed that", being the common refrain in the staff workroom. So, it's fair to say that things are off to an excellent start!

Students have begun their Enrichment programmes and are following courses in Italian, Japanese; they are debating or they are continuing with PE.

Part of our ethos is that the Sixth Form plays a vital role in the wider community and with that in mind, students have been heading out to provide support in local schools. Many opted to return to their feeder secondary schools, while others headed back to their former primary schools. They will be offering support to class teachers with reading, writing and maths skills. Some are also hoping to assist within their subject areas: supporting in Science, Art and Music.

Students have already been elected to leadership roles and they have been out and about making a real difference.

It's been great to see how well the students have settled into life with both studying and socialising at the Sixth Form. Particularly inspiring has been the focused and positive attitude to lessons, with everyone prepared and willing to participate and integrate.

Alan Beard and Esther Fransham, our DofE leaders, had guided them to this point, but now was the time for the students to start their unguided paths alone, within their 4 teams.

The 4 teams gave themselves the team names of 'The Hippos', 'Red Hot Chilli Steppers', 'Titanic Swim Team' and 'Searching for Steve Backshall'! Then the students started along their planned routes using their map and teamwork skills, completing their challenge 2 days later!

They all needed to stay focused and motivated, while still having fun and remaining positive as they completed this expedition. All 4 teams were superb and were so committed to complete each task.

Like all trips they had a few issues and challenges along the way. These ranged from poor footpaths, getting a little lost, working together and sorting out their tents, but working together they overcame them all and triumphed over every obstacle that presented itself.



After a very long and taxing first day, they eventually arrived at their base for the night, the Viney Hill Adventure Centre, and were soon cooking their food on the campfire which was followed by a night under canvas.



On the second day, having packed up their tents and bedding, they then had to find their way down to the River Severn and then return to Viney Hill Church where they had time to rest their feet as they underwent their DofE debriefing session to complete and sign off their expedition.

The students should all be very proud of their achievements, and will now, hopefully, go on to bigger DofE challenges. All students will fully complete their Bronze Award during November.

As always the students were remarkable and were a true asset to Dene Magna and to themselves.

World Skills Show



We hope that these teams will provide valuable support to our students to help them with life's ups and downs, for example, with issues such as anxiety, friendship concerns, exam stress and challenging behaviour. This may involve group work and/or individual, one-to-one support, either at school or elsewhere. Where appropriate, the mental health support team will also link up with the specialist mental health services in Gloucestershire.

They will also support parents/carers and teachers to help children and young people who are experiencing difficulties.





UK Senior Maths Challenge

On Thursday 7 November, twenty A-Level mathematics students from Dene Magna's Sixth Form will pit themselves against the best A-Level mathematicians from across the UK!

The Senior Maths Challenge is a 90-minute competition that encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems designed to make students think.

To recognise the highest performers in this country-wide maths challenge, students in the top-scoring 60% of participants can achieve a bronze, silver or gold certificate.

In addition, around 1,000 of the very highest performers are invited to take part in the British Mathematical Olympiad and around 6,000 to take part in the Senior Kangaroo competition.

Battle of the Books: Dystopia

On Wednesday 9 October the Cheltenham Literature Festival held its third Schools' Book Debate. This year's theme being Dystopia to celebrate 70 years of the Festival, and 70 years since George Orwell's 1984 was published. Over 20 Gloucestershire Secondary Schools applied to take part and we were delighted to be selected to be one of the seven schools in the Debate.

Since April this year, a group of our students from across the year groups, have been reading dystopian novels. Then concentrating on the seven selected for the 'Battle of the Books', especially the one we were to champion, 'Slated' by Teri Terry. This has involved meetings during Friday lunchtimes, as well as after school on Tuesdays this term, to prepare their presentation and arguments for why our book is the most relevant dystopian novel for today.

We took a full coach load to the Festival. All the students who had been involved in the Reading Group, plus a number of Year 7 students who had special invites to join us, to support the student who was to represent us on the panel, Jacob Atkinson from Year 9.

It had been quite challenging for the group to prepare a presentation of only one minute to cover an overview of the story plus reasons why they considered it the most relevant dystopia for today. However, Jacob did an excellent job, and particularly in answering some tough questions from the audience and judges.

This schools' competition is only in its third year, but the standard of the contestants has increased tremendously and Jacob faced very strong opposition to get through to the final three, which he did, but unfortunately losing out to Rick Yancey's 'Fifth Wave'.

Well done Jacob, we are all very proud of you!

After the debate, students had a break before listening to the author, William Sutcliffe, being interviewed about writing his dystopian novel 'We See Everything', and his recent humorous novel, 'The Gifted, the Talented and Me.' Students had so many questions for William, it was a shame there just wasn't more time for him to answer them all. However, many took the opportunity to visit him in the bookshop afterwards and got their books signed.
